 \rightarrow complete both pages and send a picture of your best work to your teacher, so she can see what a great job that you have done.




→ make your own skittles game for sightwords [use food cans from your cupboard or empty cans like drink cans for this]. You will also need a type of ball to throw at them, but it needs to be heavy enough to knock down the cans. [If they are full cans, you will need a heavier object]. If you don't have a ball at home, use another round object. For example, orange, potato, etc. Make up 6 sightwords to attach to your cans. This week's words, must be included [all, are]. I'd add these 4 gold words for your other 4 words [that, the, to, was]. If your child doesn't know any or very few gold words yet, you might like to focus in on these words. There are pictures below to help you with set up. You need to tell your child the word they are looking for and then they need to try and knock that can down. I would set the cans up in a row, spread them 15-20cm apart. Once they've knocked it down, get them to pick it up and continue on with the other words on the cans. Don't ask them the words in the order that they are lined up as it defeats the purpose of them looking for the word that they need to knock down.




Measuring Length

Demonstrate your 4 different voices (speaking, whispering, shouting, singing) to your family. Ask your family to demonstrate their different voices.	Sing Heads and Shoulders Knees and Toes and perform the actions. Repeat but, leave out different body parts one at a time – singing them in your head.	Play a freeze game with some different styles of music. Try jazz, heavy metal, operamove around your lounge room and FREEZE when the music stops.	Teach someone at home to sing Baa Baa Black Sheep. Change the colour of the sheep and who lives down the lane.
Draw what you hear. Put some music on and away you go.	Create a drum kit from things you have in the kitchen e.g. pots and pans, chopsticks, spoons, etc. Play along with a song that you like. Favourite stories are often about tales of the past. Some people have lots of stories that they may tell over and over again – sometimes not in quite the same way as the time before. Do you know someone who always starts their story with ... 'Have I ever told you about the time I ...?'







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Parent to read! There are lots of objects that help us remember things. Special souvenirs, such as coins from other places, bring back memories of a wonderful holiday. A toy you got for Christmas

when you

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were three, or a decoration from the tree help you remember that special occasion. Another example might be someone's dad who keeps a medal from when he was a running champion. There are also crosses and other religious symbols like Buddha statues that represent spiritual events.

You can gets lots of information about the past from the internet. Just click a button on your laptop and find out all sorts of things. You can also learn about events from the past by watching movies.

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
